# **The Competition Process: A first-timers guide**

**Convention will soon be here**, so no doubt you'll be putting the final touches to your performance over the next few weeks, and getting excited about what the weekend has in store.

Although we've all been focussed on our packages for many months, and know exactly what to expect and what to do when our MD gives us that first, all-important direction, for some of our newer members, what happens before we perform, and straight after, is a bit of a mystery. With that in mind, I got together with Convention Shows Manager and seasoned competitor, Jo Stevenson, to give our firsttimers an idea of what typically happens on either side of a performance.

The process is straightforward, and similar for both choruses and quartets. Stewards will be on hand to guide you through the Traffic Pattern, with all timings carefully calculated and published in advance to give you plenty of time to plan.

## All In Good Taste?

#### Quartet Prelims – didn't we have a fab day! What a treat

to experience the excellent standard of fun and heartfelt performances from the large and ever-increasing number of competing quartets. Well done everyone!

Building on the success of Quartet Prelims, Convention participants have been reminded to check that their songs and performance choices are in good taste and not likely to cause offence. To aid this activity, the Performance judges have collated some information to assist those involved in choosing songs and planning performances, which can be found at <u>https://www.labbs.org.uk/goodtaste</u>

Whilst chorus' choices are most likely decided by Music Teams, it is the responsibility of all members to understand the implications of diversity and inclusion. Members should be mindful that they don't cause unnecessary offence, and understand how to avoid breaching LABBS contest rules, which assign responsibility for judging good taste to the Performance Category.

As responsible performers, we should

ensure that all our performances – both on and off the LABBS stage - reflect contemporary attitudes and opinions and do not inadvertently cause offence to minority groups or people with protected characteristics. If you're unsure what these terms mean, check out the LABBS Diversity and Inclusion policy on the LABBS website, here https://www.labbs.org.uk/diversity

Fortunately, 'good taste' penalties are extremely rare. However, we should take time to educate ourselves, ask questions, seek advice and take action to address areas of concern. As the author, Maya Angelou, once said "Do the best you can until you know better. Then when you know better, do better".

The next song was Old Devil Moon. The guys were encouraged to release their inhibitions and not be selfconscious. I was interested to hear that it was easier to shave off movement rather than use a camel prod to start one. Someone immediately shouted out that they had stopped using the camel prod! I was blown away by the whole experience. Marty Monson dropped in and congratulated the guys on taking part saying, 'We are back together again - did we believe this would ever happen?' The quartet Kansas City BarBQ, who were all members of Central Standard, came in and announced they had come 25th in the quartet competition with a score of 79.5! They were given a round of applause and promptly sang their set.

The session rounded off with me having my photo taken with Rob and the chorus, and the filming of my Vlog. They sang The Impossible Dream', and that was exactly how I felt. You can watch that performance <u>here</u>.

# LABBS memories

#### I arrived in Yorkshire from Scotland in 1997 for
