How to build a Convention

Do you think Convention started on Friday with an

opening ceremony, and ended on Sunday with a closing ceremony? Think again! Our new Events Director, Kristina Mair, already has thoughts about 2023, 2024, 2025 and 2026 going round in her head. The 2022 Convention isn't really over for the events team until their 'wash-up' meeting when they will look at how things can be done better next time.

However, this article is really about how all the things needed to build Convention arrive, are put together, and are packed and taken away at the end. Many people are involved, but I'm not going to include names because I will doubtless miss some! In a small way this included me as some of the LABBS items such as lanyards, banners, reception items, the judges' lights, the backdrop and handbag trollies are currently stored in my garage. This means that in common with the team bringing the truck with all the main technical gear. we arrived on Wednesday ready for an early start on Thursday.

When we arrived at the centre, the artic was parked and being unloaded. A team of 16 experts was busy getting the main rig in place and setting up the lights and screens. They had started work at 6am that morning, missing hotel breakfast and being provided with a sandwich and a yoghurt to see them through. The timelapse video shows the work that went on during Thursday through to the scratch chorus that evening. We arrived at about 8.30am and started to set up the reception tables, the banners, the handbag trollies and the first timers' table. During the day another van arrived with the risers and members of the backstage team

lifted them bodily onto the stage for setting up. As Thursday wore on, more people arrived with various items in their cars - the things for the re-set room, the bra bins, the contest admin resources, the reserved labels for chairs, the frame for selfies and the BinH banners. The judges' tables, contest admin and social media were set up at exactly the distances noted in the detailed plans. Phew. Then Convention opened on Friday morning. Hurrah!

In all, a team of about 64 people were working on Convention on Saturday, plus volunteer door stewards and reception helpers probably making over 100 people contributing in total, many of whom were also competing. Thanks are due to all of them from all of us who enjoyed the fruits of their work.

On Sunday after the mixed quartet competition finished, and the audience dispersed, the teams again sprang into action. The hall became a hard hat area again very guickly and the rig started coming down. People with items in their cars collected them up and disappeared, my husband and I collected up the things we had brought, and the risers were lifted bodily off the stage and back into a van. When we left the centre at 7.05pm having videoed part of our walk round, the only people left were the team de-rigging the main auditorium, and they messaged me at 11.01 that night to say they had just finished. They drove away on Monday morning, finally leaving Bournemouth.

I cannot end this without saying how much we all missed working with Donn Roberts, our stalwart stage manager and how glad we are that he is now well. Same time next year?

Within my chorus, there are several people with mobility issues – one fellow baritone, Kathryn, was using a wheelchair for the first time and was concerned about the logistics of getting on and off stage. We needn't have worried as we were very well looked after, and all of our needs accommodated by the extremely courteous and friendly staff behind the scenes. We were escorted to the stage from the warm-up room at the five-minute warning, to enable us more time to get into position. My wheelchair was then taken behind the stage in preparation for our exit (I was able to walk on and off for our performance).

Nothing was too much trouble, and everyone was so friendly and helpful over the whole weekend. I am sure the many fellow LABBS members in similar situations will concur.

I love singing with my Spinnaker family, and being at LABBS, listening to choruses and quartets was awesome. It really is the most wonderful hobby, and the camaraderie is palpable.

My positive experience of the 2022 convention gives validation of the LABBS commitment to diversity and inclusion.

Adam-with-the-bus was a superstar all weekend, and we can't thank him enough for all the support and encouragement he gave us. There is a message in this story though: barbershop can come to you in strange ways, and through chance encounters. We should take every opportunity to share and talk about our fantastic hobby, and spread the barbershop love, because we never know who might be listening, and who might find joy in this amazing thing we do, that they never even knew existed. Just ask Adam-with-the-bus!

On Friday, IABS hosted a youth barbershop event for interested schools in the region called 'Here to Harmonise'. Facilitated by Douglas Carnes, over

200 secondary school students learned and recorded The Greatest Showman anthem 'A Million Dreams' with the help of quartet Lady Barbalade. Music teachers from the schools and interested parties from the visiting associations also observed this event, which was enabled by a grant from the World Harmony Council. By Friday afternoon, it was time for the Open Youth

competition – the first of its kind for IABS! Carrigtoohill's ABC's won this competition under the direction of Lorena Gillard.

Hot on the heels of the Youth awards, the National Quartet competition opened, with eight competing quartets. This showcased some brand-new quartets as well as some more seasoned competitors. The standard of this competition was impressive with some of the highest scores to date in any IABS contest. Guys and Dolls, a mixed quartet from Cork, took home the gold medals with a score of 76.2%.

Next on the agenda was the International Quartet competition, showcasing a diverse range of barbershop groups from seven different countries! From a field of 14 quartets, the egg-cellently named Loose Chickens from the UK were awarded the first prize with a score of 74.1%! The audience was treated to mic warming and cooling sets from 20/20, HusAar and Vocal Zone during the many competitions on the day. with the National Chorus contest, with mic warmers Cottontown Chorus entertaining the early audience before the Irish choruses took to the stage! First prize here went to Blingmasters from Dublin with a score of 76.5%. This was followed by the International Chorus contest where a fantastic variety of choruses demonstrated the depth and breadth of barbershop entertainment and emotion. This contest was won by Building Bridges Chorus (79.6%) who were also awarded the title of 2022 Supreme Champion of IABS.

In a Gala Concert that evening, gold medallists, guest quartets and choruses entertained the audience with many moving performances. It was exciting to bring so many barbershoppers together from the US and Europe after so many

years.
